What is the GSSP?



The Global Sanitation and Sustainability Project aims to improve access to sanitation (the safe disposal of human waste) and environmentally-friendly resource management initiatives worldwide.

The GSSP's overall goal is to help save lives and support the sustainable management of resources.



How will the GSSP contribute to improving sanitation and supporting sustainable resource management?



The GSSP contributes to improving access to sanitation by working to develop a toilet solution that is safe, low-cost, easy to build, simple to operate, reliable, and sustainable. The project also provides a number of support resources for water and energy conservation and sustainable waste management.

By improving access to suitable toilets, we can save lives and improve health. By improving access to information on sustainable resource management, we can support people to act in a more environmentally-responsible manner.

Who is contributing to the GSSP?



ACET-Global has brought together a team of people from diverse professional and academic backgrounds to contribute their knowledge and expertise to the GSSP. Contributors include representatives from humanitarian and nongovernment organisations, medical professionals, engineers, microbiologists, environmental scientists, designers, and local groups in the target regions.

When and where is this happening?

The GSSP began in 2016, and focuses on improving access to sanitation in remote and rural communities, where there is minimal existing sanitation infrastructure. The GSSP's support resources for sustainable resource management are available online, so they can be accessed anywhere with an internet connection.

As ACET-Global is based in Melbourne, Australia, the GSSP originates in Australia. However, the GSSP has been developed to be relevant and useful internationally.

It is hoped that the GSSP will eventually be extended to many developing countries, as well as remote and rural areas within Australia.

Why has ACET-Global chosen to focus on sanitation and sustainability?



ACET-Global's non-profit initiatives aim to improve the world in meaningful ways.

Sanitation, the safe disposal of human waste, is a basic human right that is vital for health and well-being. Around the world, 2.4 billion people (one in three of the world's population) still lack access to basic sanitation facilities (UNICEF & WHO 2015).

The lack of sanitation leaves people exposed to diseases, and pollutes the soil, air, and water (UNICEF & WHO 2015, WaterAid 2017). This leads to poor health, which contributes to endemic poverty (UNICEF & WHO 2015).

Every single day, diarrhoeal diseases caused by poor sanitation kill almost 900 children under the age of five (WASHwatch.org 2015).



Women and girls are particularly impacted by a lack of adequate sanitation facilities and often have to wait until dark to go to open fields (WaterAid 2017). This puts them at risk of attack and serious assault (WaterAid 2017). Additionally, a lack of clean, safe toilets at schools leads to an increased drop-out rate among girls once they reach puberty (WaterAid 2017). The world is facing a sanitation crisis, with a desperate need for better sanitation, particularly in developing countries. Safe, private and clean toilets are a necessity for health, dignity, privacy, and education.

By improving access to suitable toilets, we can save lives and improve health. Improving sanitation ensures greater dignity, privacy, and personal safety, therefore improving individuals' quality of life, particularly for women and girls. This will also support poverty reduction and economic development across the world.



Sustainable management of resources is vital to ensure a safe and possible future for everyone. Currently, we are using more from nature than our planet can renew in a year, effectively pushing the world beyond its limits (Earth Overshoot Day 2017). By supporting people to learn how to manage resources more sustainably in their everyday lives, we can work towards a better, safer, fairer future for all.
